
2018 General Fund Budget: No Tax Increase, Focus on Roads

The 2018 Steelton Budget continues to hold the line on taxes while making investments in infrastructure.

The 2018 Draft General Fund Budget finances the operations of Steelton Borough including its Police, Codes, Fire and EMS, and Public Works Departments. The budget governs spending in the next fiscal year including the prioritization of projects and capital purchases. A phrase to describe the 2018 General Fund Budget is "back to basics."

The 2018 budget contains no tax increases and holds the line on new spending, including a freeze on personnel positions and modest capital purchases.



Highlights of the 2018 General Fund Budget include:

Public Works: Repaying of Streets—\$250,000. The Borough also anticipated an additional \$100,000 in CDBG funds to supplement the road repaying budget.

Codes Department: Filling one property maintenance officer vacancy.

Police Department: Purchase of body cams - \$30,000

Economic Development: Demolition of 24 Adams Street - \$50,000;

Steelton Fest and Other Special Events - \$11,000

Borough Building Repairs: \$40,000

General Fund Budget Expenses total \$4,504,478. Expenses will be covered through a slight projected increase in real estate tax revenues as well as a transfer from the Borough's reserves.



2018 Sewer Fund Budget: No Rate Increase:

The 2018 Sewer Fund Budget is a \$2,044,361 spending plan. The budget appropriates \$150,000 for a sewer main replacement on Third Street and \$6,000 for a capital improvements plan.

Otherwise, the Sewer Fund Budget holds the line on new spending in order to avoid a rate increase.

The budget uses a \$66,980 transfer from Sewer Fund reserves to meet anticipated expenses.

Chlorine Contact Tank and Other Improvements Effectively Lowering DBPs in Steelton Water System

After over a month in operation, the Chlorine Contact Tank and other improvements at the Steelton Water Filtration Plant are effectively reducing disinfection byproducts (DBPs)—the source of public notices of violations over the past two years.

The contact tank was placed into operation on September 8th; other operational improvements to reduce DBPs have been in place at the Steelton Water Filtration Plant for months. Test results from September 14th samplings at sites in the Steelton Water System used for the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) reporting showed Trihalomethane (TTHM) levels cut nearly in half and well under the standards set by the United States Environmental Protection Agency and DEP. Haloacetic Acid (HAA5) levels were well below compliance levels both before and after the tank became operational. September 21st tests at the Steelton Water Filtration Plant showed TTHMs lowered even further.

"The Steelton Borough Authority, with the help of DEP, came up with a game plan that required significant time and financial resources," said Al Ausman, Authority Chairman, "I am happy to see that the contact tank supplemented by other DBP-reduction measures, is proving effective."



Although the contact tank and other improvements have made a significant impact since September 8th, the Authority will be required to issue notices of violation based on its yearly running average which was heavily influenced by pre-contact tank test results. "While we are seeing nearly immediate results from the contact tank and other measures, customers should understand that additional notices will be sent out due to compliance being based on a yearly average," said Mike Segina, Authority Vice Chairman. "If our most recent tests are any indication, we expect notices to stop once higher results from earlier in the year are removed from the average."

On top of the contact tank, the Steelton Authority invested in new DBP monitoring equipment, operational changes, and other measures to fully combat DBPs. It expects public notices to stop as the post-



Borough, The Dauphin County Land Bank Authority, and Habitat for Humanity Begin 101 Locust Street Rehabilitation Project

A volunteer crew from Habitat for Humanity and TD Connectivity joined the Borough to kick-off the 101 Locust Street Rehabilitation Project. The Dauphin County Land Bank will work with Habitat for Humanity of Greater Harrisburg to rehabilitate the property into two residential units for sale.

The project will effectively restore a former jewel of Steelton to its former condition and return the property to the Borough's tax rolls.

Honoring Frank S. Brown, The Walking Mayor:

On Sunday, October 29th, the community came together to dedicate the newly named "Frank S. Brown Boulevard" in honor of one of the Borough's most dedicated public servants.

Frank S. Brown was born in 1920 and served in the United States Army before serving Steelton as a Councilman, Brother of the Steelton Elks Lodge for over 60 years, Chairman of the Steelton Police Committee, and Steelton's first African-American Mayor. Brown served as Mayor from 1990 to 1998.

Brown was a lifelong resident of Adams Street and was known as the "Walking Mayor" for his commitment to walking the town and greeting its residents.



The community celebrated Mr. Brown's legacy on what would have been his 97th birthday by renaming Adams Street the "Frank S. Brown Boulevard."

Steelton Borough Project Update:

Steelton Authority Disinfection Byproduct Reduction Project—Chlorine Contact Tank: Completed.

Renaissance Row on North Front Street: Project The Steelton Economic Development Corporation and Chariot Companies are slated to close on the Renaissance Row development deal by the end of year. The properties are currently undergoing Phase II Environmental testing and reporting, a necessary pre-cursor to closing on an economic development transaction. Crews will be conducting testing in November with a draft report completed by mid-December. After closing at the end of year, the project will move into the land development and subdivision phase. After approval of plans, construction will begin.

Adams Street Townhouse Development Project: Final Subdivision and Land Development plans are in the process of being submitted to the Steelton Planning Commission. It is expected that the plans will be reviewed by the Planning Commission at its December meeting. After this, the plans go to Steelton Borough Council for approval. Construction is expected to begin in early 2018.

101 Locust Street : Volunteers have begun cleaning out 101 Locust Street. As of November 2017, architectural plans are being drafted for the property. Once these are finished, the Borough of Steelton will finalize an agreement to sell the property to the Dauphin County Land Bank Authority who will administer the project. Construction/renovation is expected for Spring 2018.

Washington Street Storm and Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation Project: Crews are finishing work on this project, which replaced collapsed storm/sanitary sewer lines at Front and Washington Streets. The project is anticipated to be completed by end of 2017.

- A. Singh

1. Residents have 24 hours to remove all snow and ice from all sidewalks in front of, along side, and in the rear of their properties.



- 2. Penalties for failure to remove snow and ice within 24 hours range from \$300 to \$600.
- 3. If you do not remove your snow/ice and the Borough has to do so, you will be charged removal costs on top of fines.




